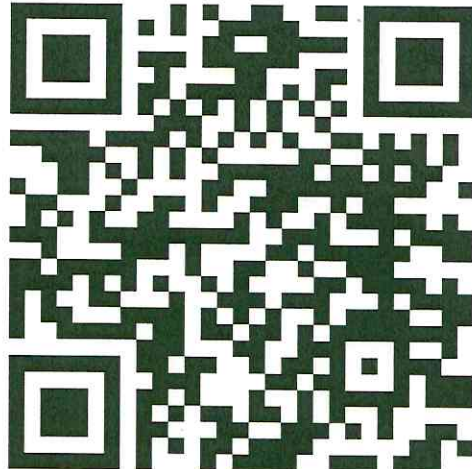

You are receiving this communication because you are listed in our system as either administrative or fiscal contacts for your facility's environmental testing. On, December 1, 2023, our amended regulation K.A.R. 28-14-2 was published in the Kansas Register. This regulation updated the Kansas Health and Environmental Laboratories schedule of fees for environmental testing. There is a 180-day grace period built into the regulation. This means the new prices established in the amended regulation will be **effective on May 29, 2024**. Any testing performed on or after this date will be billed at the new rate. Please adjust your budgets accordingly.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulation

A public hearing will be conducted at 10:30 am Friday, December 8, 2023, at the Kansas State Board of Technical Professions, 900 SW Jackson, Suite 507, Topeka, KS 66612, to adopt amendments to K.A.R. 66-14-1 regarding the number of allowed personal workplace safety or occupational safety CEU's that may be used to satisfy the required 24 CEU's related to health, safety, property, and welfare as permitted by K.S.A. 74-7013 and K.S.A 74-2025 and amendments thereto.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit comments prior to the hearing to Larry G. Karns, Executive Director, at the Kansas State Board of Technical Professions above address, or via email to KSBTPadmin@ks.gov. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the proposed regulation during the public hearing. To provide all parties with an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to ten minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation to be considered and the economic impact statement for the regulation in an accessible format. A summary of the proposed amended regulation and the economic impact of the regulations follows.

K.A.R. 66-14-1, as proposed, adds to the end of subsection (a) the following language:

"The 24 required CES's shall include no more than 10 CES's of workplace safety or occupational safety."

This language is added to limit the number of CEU's relating to personal workplace safety or occupational safety that may be used to satisfy the 24 CEU's that are related to health, safety, property, and welfare (HSPW).

The proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any significant economic impact.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulation

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE), Division of Public Health, Kansas Health and Environmental Laboratories (KHEL), will conduct a public hearing at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, October 25, 2023, in the Azure Conference Room, 4th Floor, Curtis State Office Building, 1000 SW Jackson, Topeka, Kansas, to consider the adoption of proposed amended regulation K.A.R. 28-14-2, regarding a schedule of fees for tests performed by the KHEL for Kansas public water supplies.

A summary of the proposed regulation and estimated economic impact follows:

Summary of Regulation

K.A.R. 28-14-2. Schedule of fees. Updates the pricing and language of 48 billable public water supply tests; adds nine new tests to the schedule of fees; removes five obsolete tests from the schedule of fees.

Economic Impact

Cost to the agency: The proposed regulation will not result in increased costs to the agency.

Cost to the public and regulated community: Total cost of the fee adjustments is \$791,949. These costs are charged to KHEL clients who will either absorb the cost or pass it on to the public. **This results in an average increase of roughly 35 percent for KHEL clients.** Based on feedback received from KHEL clients about the potential fee changes, the vast majority of facilities would be absorbing the costs. Only three facilities of the nearly 1,000 facilities that KHEL services responded to agency outreach and stated that they would pass these costs on to the public.

Costs to other governmental agencies or units: The main clientele of KHEL are public water supplies in the state. The costs specified above apply to city and county governments, the four tribal nations, and the Wolf Creek Nuclear Power Plant.

A detailed economic impact is provided in the economic impact statement that is available from the designated *(continued)*
